Schweizer History Teacher '11 Award Given

A Highland High School teacher is the 2011 recipient of the coveted Illinois Society Sons of the American Revolution Charles B. and Eleanor N. Schweizer American History Teacher award.

Barbara Kay, who teaches advanced placement United States history, AP European history and Women's Bio, received the plaque and a \$500 check at a luncheon ceremony in May at Springfield.

It was the third such award since its establishment by the Schweizers to recognize teachers who actively address the era of the American Revolution 1750-1800. Charles B. Schweizer, at age 95, continues to be active in the Genl. George Rogers Clark Chapter SAR, which he founded 25 years ago.

In applying, Barbara Kay described growing up listening to her father's and grandfather's stories about experiences in World Wars I and II. "Their remembrances brought history to life for me," she said. "It was just natural for me to become a history teacher so I could bring history to life for others."

Her unique teaching methods include dividing a class between colonists and the British, with each team trying to manage resources, alliances and hardships. Her students participate in "Meet the Press"-style discussions, conduct mock trials and debates, and dress in period (*Continued on Page 2*)

(Continued from Page 1) clothing to better visualize and understand events of the American Revolution.

Highland High's Assistant Superintendent of Instruction, Lynne Newton, wrote that "Barbara Kay goes out of her way to make history come alive for students throughout the district. Each year she presents Constitution Day lessons to students in grades K-6. She also presents programs on Betsy Ross and Martha Washington for grade 2-4 students."

Barbara Kay said that each year there are students who question why they should learn about the American Revolution. "Because it is the backbone of our country," she tells them. "All of our freedoms and rights can be traced back to that struggle. By taking an active part in the lessons, students realize that trial by jury, freedom of religion, all the liberties we take for granted came about because of the men and women of the Revolution."

In presenting the award, ILSSAR history teacher award chairman James A. DeGross Jr. noted that Barbara Kay has received many awards for teaching skills but "looks to her students as her greatest achievement."

She has taught American History for 32 years. She earned a bachelor of science in education degree from Northeast Missouri State University (now Truman State University) and master of arts degree from Webster University.

With approval of these, GGRCC will exceed even the Chicago chapter. Public awareness is very essential to the survival of GGRCC. GGRC Member Activities

The Green Mountain Boys Revolutionary War Flag has been added to GGRCC's collection of historic banners. James A. DeGroff Jr., chapter vice president and Illinois Society-SAR secretary, accepted it from the collection of the late Joe Smith, donated to ILSSAR. The flag, with a green field and 13 white stars set on blue, was carried by Vermont soldiers in campaigns starting with the conquest of Ft. Ticonderoga.

Compatriot DeGroff received three awards at the ILSSAR annual banquet—a silver color guard medal, silver good citizenship medal and excellence patriot award. His wife, Lola, who frequently assists GGRCC and ILSSAR projects, received the Martha Washington Medal. GGRCC President Ronnie D. Hicks received a bronze good citizenship medal, immediate Past President Gaylord (Jim) James a military service medal, and former President Timothy S. Raymer silver good citizenship medal. GGRCC received a president's citation for attendance at ILSSAR meetings, and a Joel Willis Newsletter Award for regular publication of the *Long Knife*. Several war service awards were listed in the June *Long Knife*.

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Compatriot DeGroff was a member of the color guard June 18 at Mt. Vernon during the dedication of a statue honoring Revolutionary War heroine Molly Pitcher and Army Major Tammy Duckworth, who lost both legs when her Black Hawk helicopter was shot down in Iraq. A memorial wall behind the statue honors women war participants.

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Eleven GGRCC members toured historic sites and lunched June 9 at Vandalia. They visited the restored Illinois State Capitol building, city museum and Madonna of the Trail (National Road) statue. The activity was led by Troy M. Huddle and Jerry E. Maas.

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For what is believed to be the first such cancellation, the annual Flag Day Ceremony June 14 was not held because of threat of rain.
